PRIME - Communication and Language

Enjoy listening to longer stories and can remember much of what happens.
Can find it difficult to pay attention to more than one thing at a time.
Use a wider range of vocabulary.
Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is so important.

SPECIFIC Literacy

Know many rhymes, be able to talk about familiar books and be able to tell a long story.
Can start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns.
Understand the five key concepts about print: Write some or all of their name.

Engage in story times.
Read individual letters by saying the sounds for them. Form lower-case and capital letters correctly

SPECIFIC - Expressive Arts and Design

Activities

- ❖ Attainment on Entry Assessments.
- ❖ Create Self portraits for 'Who Am I?' display.

- ❖ Where the Wild Things Are –, Design a 'Wild Me' creature.
- ❖ Participate in Story/Poetry/Singing/Movement sessions throughout the day

SPECIFIC - Mathematics

Fast recognition of up to 3 objects, without having to count them individually (subitising).
Recite numbers past 5.

Say one number for each item in order: 1,2,3,4,5.

Know that the last number reached when counting a small set of objects tells you how many there are in total (cardinal principle) Understand position through words alone with no pointing.
Compare quantities using language 'more than' 'fewer than'.

Talk about and explore 2D and 3D shapes using informal and mathematical language such as sides, corners straight, flat and round.

Count objects, actions and sounds.
and create repeating patterns.

Activities

- ❖ Statutory Baseline Assessments.
- ❖ Attainment on Entry Assessments
- ❖ Daily sessions linked to White Rose Maths and NCETM Mastering Number,
- ❖ Daily Opportunities to develop a deep understanding of number – Reciting, counting, matching, ordering, estimating.
- ❖ Daily Counting rhymes and songs.
- ❖ Independent role play activities that allow children to demonstrate their ability to transfer their mathematical understanding and problem solving skills into a wide range of different scenarios.
- ❖ Resources/Games for children to choose in 'Busy Learning' Time for example dice to play how many claps, jumps do I need to do.

Activities and books are subject to change so that we have the opportunity to follow the children's interests and world events as they happen.

SPECIFIC - Understanding the World

Begin to make sense of their own life-story and their families history.
Know that there are different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in photos.

Talk about what they see, using a wide vocabulary.

Comment on images of familiar situations in the past.

Talk about members of their immediate family and community.

Recognise some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries.

Activities

- ❖ Linked to the topic 'Inside Outside...Who Am I?' the children will bring in photographs of their family to create a display in the Home Corner.
- ❖ Linked to Creation-God's Gifts the children will learn about how the world began and talk about and describe what they know about the wonderful world around them.
- ❖ Listening to stories such as Dear Earth and The World came to my place today.
- ❖ What country/city do I live in? Where is it on a map of the UK?
- ❖ What is my home like today? Is my house old or new? Can you name the rooms in your house?
- ❖ Can you explain what is similar and different between the houses we live in?
- ❖ What is a plan, a map, an aerial image?
- ❖ Where is our school? What can we see in our local community?
- ❖ Linked to Literacy - Where the Wild Things Are – Which countries have jungles? Use a world map to locate these countries.
- ❖ Explore a jungle environment. What animals live there and why?
- ❖ Talk about their lives and how they compare to the characters in the story. What is the same? What is different? Would you like to live in the jungle?
- ❖ What happens in Autumn?

Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is so important. Learn new vocabulary. Describe events in some detail. Use talk to help work out problems and organise thinking and activities

SPECIFIC Literacy

Understand the five key concepts about print. Write some or all of their name.

Engage in story times. Re-read what they have written to check that it makes sense.

Read individual letters by saying the sounds for them.

Form lower-case and capital letters

Blend sounds into words, so that they can read short words made up of known-letter sound correspondences.

Activities

- ❖ Use their language and new vocabulary as a powerful means of widening contacts, sharing feelings, experiences and thoughts about stories, poems and rhymes that have been read to them in class.
- ❖ Begin to independently write their own name with focus on good handwriting habits (posture, pencil hold, paper) and letter formation.
- ❖ Sound! Start Phonics for Letters and Sounds – Revision of Phase 2 Learning a Letter Lesson, Phase 3 Main Phonics Lesson, Daily Small Group Practise and Apply activities.
- ❖ Daily Guided Reading sessions – x3 with an adult x2 Whole Class guided reading.
- ❖ Shared and Independent Writing Activities linked to – Bringing the Rain to Kapiti Plain
- ❖ Voting Station – Daily vote for my favourite book. Book Corner/Reading Bears – Read one of your favourite books to me.

- ❖ Move confidently with growing control in Dance and Yoga sessions.

Reception Class – AUTUMN 2 'Knowing Yourself... Knowing Me, Knowing You'

SPECIFIC - Expressive Arts and Design

Remember and sing entire songs. Create their own songs or improvise a song around one they know.

Play instruments with increasing control to express their feelings and ideas.

Explore, use and refine a variety of artistic effects to express their ideas and feelings.

Listen attentively, move to and talk about music, expressing their feelings and responses.

Watch and talk about dance and performance art, expressing their feelings and responses.

Activities

- ❖ Arts and crafts linked to the stories they will be sharing in Literacy and R.E.
- ❖ Bringing the Rain to Kapiti Plain – Investigate and design African music, instruments, clothing and jewellery.
- ❖ Arts and crafts linked to Bonfire Night, Remembrance Day, Diwali and Christmas.
- ❖ Participate in Story/Poetry/Singing/Movement sessions throughout the day
- ❖ Explore instruments/sounds, beat, rhythm.

Religious Education

SPECIFIC - Mathematics

Experiment with their own symbols and marks as well as numerals.

Solve real world mathematical problems with numbers up to 5.

Talk about and explore 2D and 3D shapes using informal and mathematical language such as sides, corners, straight, flat and round. Begin to describe a sequence of events, real or fictional, using words such as first, then.

Count objects, actions and sounds.

Count beyond 10

Compare numbers Understand the 'one more than/one less than' relationship between consecutive numbers.

Automatically recall number bonds for numbers 0-10.

Select, rotate and manipulate shapes in order to develop spatial reasoning skills.

Activities

- ❖ Daily sessions linked to White Rose Maths and NCETM Mastering Number.
- ❖ Daily Opportunities to develop a deep understanding of number – Reciting, counting, matching, ordering, estimating.
- ❖ Daily Counting rhymes and songs.
- ❖ Independent role play activities that allow children to demonstrate their ability to transfer their mathematical understanding and problem solving skills into a wide range of different scenarios.
- ❖ Resources/Games for children to choose in 'Busy Learning' Time for example dice to play how many claps, jumps do I need to do.
- ❖ Continuous provision resources to promote number formation, representation of numbers and amounts, recognizing, drawing and building with shapes
- ❖ Voting Station – comment on which book has won the vote using the correct mathematical vocabulary – more/fewer. Estimate and explain. Count to check.

SPECIFIC - Understanding the World

Know that there are different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in photos.

Talk about what they see, using a wide vocabulary

Comment on images of familiar situations in the past. Compare and contrast characters from stories, including figures from the past.

Talk about members of their immediate family and community. Draw information from a simple map.

Recognise some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries.

Activities

- ❖ Find out about the history of Bonfire Night.
- ❖ Find out about the history of Remembrance Day.
- ❖ Explore the festival of Diwali.
- ❖ My Granny Went to Market A Round the World Counting Rhyme. What is a market? Have you ever been to one? –The children will travel around the World on an unforgettable shopping trip.
- ❖ What country do I live in? Where is it on a map of the UK?
- ❖ Linked to Literacy – Bringing the Rain to Kapiti Plain – Where is Kapiti Plain? Use a world map to locate Africa and Kenya.
- ❖ Talk about their lives and how they compare to the characters in the story. What is the same? What is different? Would you like to visit Africa? How will you get there? What will you see?
- ❖ Find out about African animals.
- ❖ Identify African animals by their markings.
- ❖ Find out about the Masai tribe.
- ❖ Why do we celebrate Christmas?
- ❖ An Interesting Word for Every Day of the Year – will give the children the opportunity to share their understanding of the word in a particular context whilst widening their vocabulary.
- ❖ Develop an awareness of how information can be retrieved from computers.
- ❖ Learn about E-safety and how they can keep themselves safe whilst using it.
